

GREETINGS



s spring approaches, we are looking forward to the beautiful weather and all the opportunities the season brings! We have been hard at work on exciting projects to promote wildlife conservation and education as well as updates on grounds to create even more opportunities for wonderful memories with family and friends. I am eager to share just some of our latest developments. In early 2023, your Zoo broke ground on the expansion and upgrade of our MetaZoo Discovery Center. On hand were Mayor and Mrs. Greenberg, Deputy Mayors Nicole George and David James, Metro Council members, Zoo Foundation and Friends of the Zoo board members, "Future Healers Got Zoo Buddies" families, and our wonderful donors to this critical project. This renovation will enhance accommodations for our education animal ambassadors, allowing visitors to enjoy even more opportunities to connect with and learn about the special creatures in our care.

Our avian enthusiasts will be thrilled to hear that the renovation of our hyacinth macaw exhibit is nearly complete and will be ready to welcome visitors soon. Their new habitat provides an even more stimulating environment for these giant, charismatic parrots, native to South America.

While there's lots to celebrate at the Zoo — we have crucial conservation efforts right in our region to celebrate as well! Your Louisville Zoo is now partnering with Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KYDFWR), Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Purdue University, and University of Kentucky to eventually hatch, raise and release eastern hellbenders. These unique salamanders are the largest in North America and are native to our state. This program is the first dedicated to releasing hellbenders into Kentucky waterways. We are proud to be part of the effort to ensure their survival.

In addition to our hellbender partnership, we are also working with KYDFWR, Eastern Kentucky University and Murray State University, to install two MOTUS towers in our state. MOTUS is a wildlife tracking system that monitors the movements of migratory



birds, bats and insects fitted with transponders. By better understanding their behavior and movements, we can improve the protection of these species and ensure their survival for years to come. Your Zoo is sponsoring the equipment and installation of the towers through conservation funding contributed by you and your fellow terrific guests and members.

These are among a few of the exceptional projects we are thrilled to champion through your generosity, with many more to come! As you visit with us this year, we hope you will be inspired to act and help protect wildlife and habitats that make our community such a unique and beautiful place. Cultivating pollinator plants, installing bird and bat houses, and providing fresh water in bird baths and garden pools are just some of the ways to help your neighborhood creatures. And remember — when you visit your Zoo, you are joining the effort as we work to save animals, together!

Butterflies N' Blooms

Butterflies Flutter Back to Your Zoo!

The Louisville Zoo is excited to announce the return of its popular Butterflies n' Blooms exhibit, featuring native butterflies and open from May 20 through Sept. 17. This exhibit offers visitors the chance to get up close with hundreds of winged beauties, all while learning about the importance of pollinators and their role in supporting our ecosystem.

Located near our Etscorn Garden, the butterfly house is a tranquil and interactive space where visitors can observe hundreds of free-flying native butterflies. The exhibit features a variety of plants that serve as a nectar sources for the butterflies. A monarch waystation sits next to the exhibit, providing critical habitat for butterflies and nectar sources like milkweed, buttonbush, Canada goldenrod and smooth blue aster!

Guests will have the opportunity to learn about the butterfly life cycle, from egg to caterpillar to chrysalis

to butterfly, and how these beautiful creatures contribute to the health of our environment. It's the perfect way to learn more about nature conservation in your own backyard and actions you can take to protect our local ecosystems. Butterflies n' Blooms is included with Zoo admission and is open daily from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., weather permitting. We hope to see you there!

Zoo Buddies!


Zoo Buddies with an Aldabra tortoise

The Louisville Zoo's mission has always been "to better the bond between people and our planet." It's a vision that requires constant improvement, and we have been steadfast in efforts to continually cultivate more compassion for both wildlife and the humans who share this beautiful world.

As part of these efforts, the Louisville Zoo is forging ahead with a program to help children traumatized by gun violence, giving them a safe and inclusive space to learn from animals while building positive memories. Now moving into its second year, "Future Healers Got Zoo Buddies" has helped these children grow in ways we hoped and in ways we could never have imagined!

The program was named by those it helps: children ages 4 - 13 who have been impacted by the sometimesinvisible effects of secondary trauma following gun violence. This is a kind of trauma that's experienced when hearing details or witnessing the aftermath of another person's traumatic experience. While it's impossible to take away the trauma these children have endured, the Zoo focuses on what it can do: provide a safe place for them to find refuge from their trauma and embrace the healing influence of the natural world.

The foundation of the Zoo Buddies program dates back to the challenging year of 2020. Amid a global pandemic, Louisville was also suffering from a record-breaking number of homicides. Knowing what was at stake for our community, the



Zoo connected with local activist Christopher 2X, whose Game Changers program with UofL Health was already positively influencing youth in our community suffering from secondary trauma due to violence. Together, we established Zoo Buddies — an extension of Future Healers and a tool to cultivate compassion and love within a group of young people who had already braved so much.


"Allowing these kids to go beyond the stresses of violent crime and the trauma they've experienced, step outside of themselves, and see their role in planetary health is the key to creating the humanitarian advocates we hope emerge from this program," Christopher 2X said. "I am looking forward to this second year and, even further down the road, seeing our littlest Zoo Buddies graduate and walk out into the world as bold ambassadors for our planet and its wildlife!"

Tiffany McDougal is the mother of two Zoo Buddies, 6-year-old Ny'Sear and 11-year-old Ny'Ree McDougal. They began the program and started learning about bees — a vital part of pollination around our planet. These hard-working insects exemplify working together and living in harmony with nature. Bees are also often assumed to be harmful, or something to be afraid of emotions McDougal's children knew all too well. Once they began building bee boxes, learning about the Zoo's hives, and meeting with the beekeepers, she instantly noticed a change.

"Believe it or not, when I've seen Ny'Ree light up like a lightning bug the most, it was with bees," McDougal said. "Even though she loves her sloths, she was really into the bees."

At the heart of the education curriculum for Zoo Buddies is the concept that we have one mind, one body, one life and one planet. It's taken in part from the "One Health" approach — a public health initiative that strives to understand the connection between humans, animals, plants and the environment.

For McDougal, it's meant major developments for her children as their focus, concentration and confidence in school assignments have improved.



"They're also more cautious about everything earth-related, like littering, and really caring about the oceans," she said.

While the kids have astounded the Zoo team with their engagement, enthusiasm and compassion, having their parents' participation and support in each session has proved integral to the program's success.

The curriculum includes Zoo walks, special presentations and field trips to different animal areas — creating immersive experiences and bright, positive memories for the attendees and their parents.

As we move into our second year of Zoo Buddies, our education

team continues to improve ways of delivering content, and several conservation partnerships are in the works.

Kim Allgeier, the Zoo's Education Curator said, "Instead of doing a different lesson each month, we have a theme every two months with lessons that connect. We're also adding optional family activities between sessions. We are hoping to schedule a session with Polar Bears International, a conservation partner, since the children are learning about Glacier Run. The award-winning exhibit is based on the notion that humankind and nature must co-exist — a principal mission of Zoo Buddies."

One heartwarming story to come from Zoo Buddies so far involves 8-year-old Daniya Pitts. On her way to school one morning, Daniya pleaded with her mother, Jovan, to pull the car over so she could move a turtle out of the road to safety.



"I knew at that moment that the lessons on animal care and compassion had really hit home," Ms. Pitts said. "I wanted Daniya to see what it takes to care for someone — the animals — and not just look at them but to see that it actually takes a team to care for them, like how we as parents have to care for our kids and nurture them."



Daniya's love for animals has now earned her the nickname "Dr. Dolittle," and while she still aspires to be a hairstylist one day, Daniya has recently added a second career to her wish list: veterinarian.

"Hearing from the families about moments like Daniya moving the turtle to safety and witnessing similar moments myself is what this program is about," said Christopher 2X.

Each interaction within Zoo Buddies helps to continue our mission, and we are looking forward to watching our new Zoo buddies grow, heal and "better the bond between people and our planet."



Little Penguin Sees World Anew...

Successful Cataract Surgery Restores Eyesight


The Louisville Zoo is home to over 1,100 animals. While caring for so many animals may be challenging, our dedicated teams of keepers, veterinary staff and generous community partners help to ensure each animal at the Zoo receives top-notch, specialty care. One example of this specialized care was the recent cataract surgery that was performed to restore the sight of Rabbit, our 15-year-old, male little penguin.

Rabbit hatched at the New England Aquarium in Boston and came to the Louisville Zoo in 2019. The 15-year-old little penguin has produced four offspring in our Little Penguin Conservation Center. With his calm demeanor, Rabbit has proven to be a good parent, allowing the keepers to assist in caring for his offspring without displaying any signs of aggression.

Rabbit's vision had been gradually declining due to cataracts, making it difficult for him to navigate his habitat. He would bump into structures and needed more attention during feeding, with the keepers having to touch his beak to signal the presence of food.

Cataracts are not uncommon in Zoo penguins, and (like in humans) age is a risk factor for the development of this condition. Penguin cataract surgery has been performed in zoos around the world, but not often in little penguins like Rabbit. While Rabbit is not a young bird, his care team felt surgery was worth the risk to help improve his welfare and safeguard his ability to sire and rear chicks.

Enter Dr. Erica Tolar, the Zoo's consulting veterinary ophthalmologist for the past 16 years. Dr. Tolar is the only board-certified veterinary ophthalmologist in the Louisville area, working out of her private practice, Bluegrass Veterinary Vision. "I have been doing work with the Louisville Zoo since I've been in town and I love it," she shared. Dr. Tolar has a wealth of experience in performing cataract surgery on a variety of exotic animals, including a kestrel, toucan and even a tiger cub.



To confirm Rabbit was a suitable candidate for surgery, an electroretinogram (ERG) and ultrasound exam were performed on his eyes prior to the procedure. The challenges in performing cataract surgery on such a small animal are numerous. Anesthesia was the first challenge - Zoo Senior Staff Veterinarian Dr. Zoli Gyimesi and the Animal Health Center team were able to perform that careful and sensitive process. Another challenge was the small size of the penguin's eye, leaving little room for error. Despite the challenges, Dr. Tolar utilized the same equipment and techniques used in human medicine to perform the delicate surgery successfully. The



surgery (phacoemulsification) took approximately 25 minutes per eye.

The post-operative care for Rabbit was a challenge as well. To prevent infection, Rabbit was kept out of any pools. Staff administered eye drops several times a day. Our animal patients can't talk to us when there is an issue, so the keepers' keen observations were critical in the post-operative period.

This story has a happy ending. The surgery not only restored Rabbit's sight but has also improved his quality of life, allowing him to navigate his environment with ease, maneuver the waters of his habitat, and interact with other penguins in his group. He is also much more active and eager to nest again — continuing his important role in safeguarding the future of these incredible birds.

Dr. Tolar said, "The most rewarding part of cataract surgery in any animal is the ability to restore vision and improve their quality of life. Watching Rabbit navigate his environment with the enthusiasm of old is fantastic. He can confidently walk down paths he couldn't before and swims without hesitation. He is interacting with the other birds in the flock and hopefully will have a new mate. Seeing his improvement is more rewarding than words can express."

We hope you will also come see Rabbit and follow his adventures! You can see him with his "waddle" of little penguins, weather permitting, in the Islands Zone.

Flamingo Chicks

The Zoo had some recent additions to our flock — two Chilean flamingo chicks! These chicks hail from the Memphis Zoo; the first chick arrived shortly after it hatched, while the other was transported to the Louisville Zoo still inside its egg! The egg was then artificially incubated and hatched about a week after arriving at the Zoo.

For hand-rearing, our bird department makes a version of crop-milk (a liquid excretion high in fat and protein that flamingos feed to baby birds) that consists of cooked egg yolks, egg whites, calcium, liquid, and vitamins, that are blended into a formula that staff feeds the chicks. Chicks are fed six to seven times per day, gradually decreasing over time.

James McKinney, the Zoo's Curator of birds, said, "Since chicks do grow relatively quickly, and being that they are long-legged birds, attention must be given to proper growth and development. Chicks must get regular amounts of exercise for proper leg development." Even with Zoo staff exercising the chicks multiple times a day, there were still some challenges with their leg development. After reaching out to other zoos who have encountered similar issues, the veterinary and bird teams consulted with a chiropractor with a special Kinesio tape certification to wrap the chicks' legs. The birds are still being treated, but this technique appears to have been successful thus far. The birds are now being introduced to the rest of the flamingo "flamboyance" (group of flamingos)!

SUMATRAN TIGER, KAMI

The Zoo recently welcomed a new male Sumatran tiger, Kami Sambal, to our Islands exhibit! Kami is 15 years old and joins us from the Oklahoma City Zoo. Kami has adjusted well to his new home and is now on rotation with the Zoo's other Sumatran tigers, Jingga and Leela. Kami joins us with a breeding recommendation as part of the Sumatran Tiger Species Survival Program (SSP) which works to maintain the genetic diversity of managed animal populations.

AVIAN FLU UPDATE

In response to confirmed cases of avian flu in our region last year, we took temporary measures such as closing our walk-through aviaries and moving several bird species into indoor protected areas. These efforts helped to keep our animals safe from disease, with no positive cases found in our bird populations. After continued monitoring, our animal care team determined it was safe to reopen our walkthrough aviaries and move birds back on exhibit. We will continue to keep you updated with any changes regarding our animal population and Avian Flu. Be sure to follow us on our social media channels!

He and Lisa enjoyed observing the animals, talking with staff, seeing the botanical collection come to life, and hearing the laughter of children. After their own children arrived, the Zoo continued to offer their family a peaceful escape and gave Walter and Lisa the opportunity to show their children animals they had only seen in books, movies or on TV.



On January 28, 2023, the Louisville Zoo broke ground on a \$2.8 million construction project that will support the growth and development of its Animal Ambassador Program and provide new office and training spaces to our conservation education team. Donors, board members, community members, Mayor Craig Greenberg, Deputy Mayor Nicole George, Zoo volunteers and staff joined Director Dan Maloney to mark this momentous occasion.

We are excited to begin construction on this critical next step in the growth of our Animal Ambassador Program, which connects so many in our region to memorable, awe-inspiring learning experiences. As accreditation standards put forth by the Association of Zoos and

Aquariums continue to evolve for ambassador programs, we are working to stay ahead of and exceed guidelines for animal welfare.

The planned renovations, which were fully funded by private donations, will begin immediately. They will reinforce the Zoo as the hub of conservation education for the region and reaffirm our commitment to outstanding animal care.
